The bowl was returned to the Council by Michael's mother for safekeeping.

Afternoon activities

A full programme of activities was laid on for the afternoon with a choice of a Spire Tour at the cathedral for the more adventurous members or a leisurely walk around Chichester's parks and gardens. The walkers met after lunch at the theatre Coffee and learned about the history of the theatre before walking through the Community Orchard and heading for Priory Park. There was a bowls match in full swing and the immaculately kept lawns were much admired. The link between William Blake and the Guildhall was explained and some of our British members burst out in a spontaneous rendering of Jerusalem.



Our walk continued along North Walls to the beautiful Bishop's Palace Garden before stopping briefly in the Community Garden. The two groups were reunited at the cathedral where they were welcomed by the Dean, **Dr Edward Dowler** before attending Choral Evensong.

Evening Social

The day was rounded off with a social evening at the Fishbourne Church Hall, where our French visitors sampled a British speciality: Fish and Chips.



Sunday May 4

A group visit was arranged to **The D Day Story** in Portsmouth, where hosts and their guests toured the museum's exhibits with the help of audio-guides. One of the highlights was a visit to one of the landing craft used in the invasion which has been restored and placed outside the museum. This gave us a glimpse of what it must have been like to cross the channel on that fateful day.



Another highlight was the magnificent Overlord Embroidery which relates the story of D-Day in 38 large panels. (*An article on the embroidery can be found on page 7*). After the visit to the museum, we moved on to Gunwharf Quays to enjoy Sunday lunch at the Old Customs House. The evening was spent *en famille*.

Monday May 5

The day was free for hosts to arrange their own activities. Arundel was a popular destination with its historic castle and churches, and the option for some of a visit to the Wetlands Centre. For those who visited the castle, we caught the end of the Tulip Festival with dazzling displays in the gardens.

In the evening, we held our Gala Dinner at **The Inglenook** in Pagham, a lovely venue which was much enjoyed by all.



The next morning it was time to say goodbye, always a sad occasion, but we look forward to our return visit to Chartres next year.



The Overlord Embroidery

The Overlord Embroidery, created over a six-year period starting in 1968, is one of the highlights of **The D-Day Story** in Southsea. It echoes the Bayeux Tapestry, created 900 years earlier, and depicts the D-Day landing on June 6, 1944 and the subsequent Battle of Normandy. It comprises 34 hand-stitched panels running in total to 83 metres in length – 10 metres longer than the Bayeux Tapestry, which of course is also an embroidery.

The work was commissioned by Lord Dulverton and made by the Royal School of Embroidery from designs made by Sandra Lawrence, a twenty-two year old artist. The paintings she prepared for this work are now displayed in the Pentagon.

The first panels show the early years of the war including war-time production of munitions and the Blitz. The embroidery continues with the entry of the USA into the war and the planning and preparation of the invasion. Most of the work covers the crossing of the Channel and the combat on the beaches in Normandy. It ends with the British infantry advancing as the German troops retreat.



A team of twenty embroiderers from the Royal College of Needlework worked on the embroidery for four years. To transfer the artist's designs to the canvas, they used a technique called *appliqué*. This involves pricking thousands of tiny holes in tracing paper, placing them on a panel and applying a fine powder. This leaves a trail of dots which can be joined with a pencil to reveal the design. Once the design was in place, coloured fabrics including battledress khaki and gold braid were stitched on to the panels. Fine details were added using coloured stitching.

News from Chartres

Chartres fait le tour du monde et célèbre l'Europe lors de la "Promenade des Jumelages"

Chartres, le 31 mai 2025 – Le "Joli Mai de l'Europe" a trouvé son point d'orgue ce samedi matin à Chartres, avec la très attendue "Promenade des Jumelages". Organisée par Chartres International dans le cadre du Relais de la Coopération Décentralisée de Cités Unies France, cette balade a offert aux participants une immersion unique dans l'histoire des liens qui unissent la cité eurélienne au reste du monde.



Point de Départ



Place de Chichester

Dès 9h15, un groupe de participants enthousiaste s'est rassemblé devant la Conciergerie, sur l'esplanade de la cathédrale. Curieux et passionnés, ils étaient prêts pour cette "Promenade des Jumelages" qui les a conduits à travers les rues et jardins de Chartres, chacun portant le nom d'une ville jumelle. De la rue de Bethléem (Palestine) au paisible Jardin de Sakurai (Japon), en passant par les Places de Chichester (Angleterre), Spire (Allemagne), Évora (Portugal) et Ravenne (Italie), chaque étape a été l'occasion de découvrir les histoires et anecdotes derrière ces partenariats internationaux.

Le parcours s'est achevé symboliquement à l'Hôtel de Ville, salon Montescot, face aux photos de Ronda, notre nouvelle ville jumelle en Andalousie (Espagne). Mais cette journée était doublement festive, puisqu'elle coïncidait également avec le séjour de nos amis de Spire pour leur traditionnel échange de l'Ascension, orchestré par l'association Les Amis des Jumelages de Chartres.

Dans la période troublée que nous traversons, cette célébration des jumelages et de l'amitié internationale a pris un sens tout particulier. Comme l'a souligné Patrick Géroutet, il est essentiel d'être heureux de vivre dans une Union Européenne qui, fidèle aux vœux de ses fondateurs dans les années 1950, maintient avec force les valeurs démocratiques et la paix.

Chartres Tours the World and Celebrates Europe with a "Twinning Walk"

Chartres, May 31, 2025 – The "Beautiful European May" culminated this Saturday morning in Chartres with the keenly anticipated "Twinning Walk." Organized by **Chartres International** as part of the *Relais de la Coopération Décentralisée de Cités Unies France*, this walk offered participants a unique experience of the links connecting this Eure-et-Loir city to the rest of the world.

At 9:15 am, an enthusiastic group of participants gathered in front of the Conciergerie, on the cathedral's esplanade. Eager to learn, they set out on the "Twinning Walk" which led them through Chartres' streets and gardens, each named after a twin city. From **Bethlehem Street** (Palestine) to the peaceful **Sakurai Garden** (Japan), passing by the Squares of **Chichester** (England), **Speyer** (Germany), **Évora** (Portugal), and **Ravenna** (Italy), each stop was an opportunity to discover the stories and anecdotes behind these international partnerships.



The journey concluded symbolically at the **Hôtel de Ville**, in the **Salle Montescot Room**, facing photos of **Ronda**, our new twin city in Andalusia (Spain). The day was doubly festive, as it coincided with the stay of our friends from Speyer for their traditional Ascension Day exchange, organised by the **Les Amis des Jumelages de Chartres** association.

In these troubled times, this celebration of twinning and international friendship took on a particularly significant meaning. As **Patrick Géroudet** stressed, we should be happy to live in a European Union that, true to the wishes of its founders in the 1950s, strongly upholds democratic values and peace.

The morning concluded on a cordial note. A pleasant stay was wished to our friends from Speyer present in Chartres, with a commitment to meet them again next year in their city. A vibrant "Vive l'Europe!" concluded this special event, reminding everyone that exchanges and friendships between peoples are the pillars of a shared future.

Did you know?

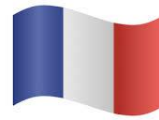
Chartres is twinned with 8 cities in 7 different countries. The latest twinning, Ronda, in Andalusia, was established this year. The 8 twin cities all have an impressive history as can be seen below. Chartres has been included for comparison.

Bethlehem Palestine		The Church of the Nativity in Bethlehem was first built in 326. The current building dates back to the 6 th century but was extensively renovated by the Crusaders.
Chartres France		Built and decorated between 1134 and 1260, registered by UNESCO as a World Heritage Site, Chartres Cathedral is considered one of the finest of the Gothic cathedrals.
Chichester UK		Chichester celebrates an important anniversary this year. It is 950 years since the Diocese was created, and work began on building the cathedral.
Evora Portugal		Evora's cathedral was built in the Gothic style in the 13 th century on the foundations of a 12 th century church constructed after the Arab rulers had left the area.
Leon Spain		Leon Cathedral, also built in the Gothic style, was completed in the mid-13 th century and, like Chartres has a fine collection of stained glass.
Ravenna Italy		The Basilica of San Vitale in Ravenna, famous for its exquisite mosaics, was completed in 547 and is an important surviving example of early Byzantine art.
Ronda Spain		Ronda is an ancient city where both Moorish and Roman remains survive. It is situated on two hills divided by a deep ravine crossed by several bridges.
Sakurai Japan		It is in the area around Sakurai that the first Japanese emperors established their capitals and many of the country's oldest shrines and temples, can be found.
Speyer Germany		Speyer Cathedral dates back to 1030 and is a fine example of Romanesque architecture. It was the burial place of the German emperors for almost 300 years.
